The regular meeting of Elyria City Council was called to order on Monday November 1, 2021 at 7:02 p.m. by President Stewart. President Stewart opened the meeting with a moment of reflective silence followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by Mr. Callahan. President Stewart asked audience members to please silence cell phones.

### **Safety Service Director Brubaker:**

Safety Service Director Brubaker shared that leaf pick up began the week of October 25th. The second update provided was the distribution of an article from The Villager Newspaper regarding Giada Pulig, who set up two blessing boxes, one right outside of city hall, one at south recreation center. Giada built the boxes with her dad as part of her Girl Scout program. The boxes will store non-perishable food items. The box located outside of city hall has been re-filled a couple of times in the last couple of weeks. Giada's parents and grandparents are from Elyria. Her Grandfather was a former street department employee, which is the reason for her give to the

City of Elyria. SSD Brubaker also extended kudos to Mr. Schneider from the Building and Lands Department who helped to secure both boxes in their locations.

Police Chief Whitely: No report

### Fire Chief Pronesti:

Chief Pronesti shared that unfortunately there was a double fatal motor vehicle accident on Cleveland St. and Route 57. He says this is the sixth fatality to date this year. The other update provided, the fire department will take delivery of the new pumper on November 10<sup>th</sup> to station 4 on the north side. Chief Pronesti expressed his admiration for Police Chief Whitely. He asked that council would thank Chief Whitely.

President Stewart congratulated chief Pronesti and thanked him for the kind words toward Chief Whitely, certainly the words were well-deserved.

Mr. Oswald asked if there is a specific reason for the accidents at Cleveland St. And route 57 that the Chief may have information about. Chief Whitely responded to say that there have been six fatal crashes this year with eight people killed in the crashes and the latest is the first at Cleveland St. and Route 57. The crash was at 2:30 a.m. and one of the vehicles was traveling at an extremely high rate of speed, there is a possibility of alcohol involvement. The double fatality on Abbe Rd. is still under investigation, however no alcohol is suspected.

### Eng. Schneider:

Engineer Schneider provided an update to street resurfacing. The contractor anticipates working on Gulf Rd. Monday November 8<sup>th</sup>. The road will be shut down tentatively from the wastewater plant north to Windbrook Dr. for guard rail installation. The project should be completed within a week. December 9<sup>th</sup> at 6:00p.m. in council chambers, a public meeting will be held for Cleveland St.

President Stewart asked for confirmation regarding resurfacing of all of the streets. Mr. Schneider responded all resurfacing will be completed, adjustments for manholes could lag behind however. The Abbe Rd. project from Cleveland St. to route 57 is an Ohio Public works project that has been approved and bid out. The contractor is behind and unsure if the work will be completed. It would be placed on the schedule for te first of the year, next year, along with Burns Rd., from Abbe to Gulf.

Mrs. Mitchell stated that the process for ranking the streets and providing them to the engineering department can start earlier in the year, so tat the bid process can start earlier as well. She would prefer to start earlier opposed to street resurfacing being incomplete, because the contractors are running behind. Mr. Schneider agreed, he stated the bid was completed in June, however what they have experienced is backlog from the contractors. The job was pushed back

to October 1<sup>st</sup>, due to schedule constraints and weather related issues. Mrs. Mitchell confirmed that the Utilities committee will definitely start the process earlier for 2022.

Mrs. Keys asked for an update on the University Hospitals emergency room crosswalks project. Mr. Schneider responded that materials have been ordered, however they have not been received as of yet. He will confirm the status of the material order and provide an update.

Mr. Oswald inquired about two projects: windward siphon and shovel-readiness at pump stations near Briar Lake park. Mr. Korzan provided an update on the windward siphon, flow meters were put in the sewers about a year and a half ago, the information is being reviewed. Once the department has some conclusions, the size of th siphon can be determined. The other project is still in the works, there is no hardcore information to provide.

### 7. PETITIONS LOBBY:

John Gall, 424 Augusta, Elyria, Statistics and Directions- Mr. Gall stated "the destroyed rubble of Vic's, the old warehouse, Shane Furniture store, downtown decay, the midway mall shell and empty restaurants littering the area. The open air Amtrak station, Reaser Pointe Crossing, Chestnut Commons connector debacle, Chestnut commons and route 57 traffic jams. Job situation Riddell 2017 was, we lost 320 jobs, 3M in 2019 150 jobs, Moen 2019, 73 jobs, Bendix 2021 550 jobs. Crime, the chance of being a victim of a violent crime, is 1 in 392. Property crime, 1 in 58. There are 154 sex offenders with a ration of 1 to 353 residents in Elyria. Moneyinc.com rates the City of Elyria the 19th most dangerous city in Ohio 2019. Percentage of residents in poverty, 23.1%, median income, \$44,324.00, median house value, \$107,989.00, rent is \$741.00 monthly. The 2020 census shows a decline in population 54,533 to 52, 656 residents. Labor force participation, nearly 62.2%. The meantime travel to work is 23 minutes. This city has the synergy of becoming a ghost town. This is a failing scorecard council has accumulated especially over the last two years. This spectacular display of incompetence is as empty as the accomplishments as the midway mall is of shoppers. Things have gotten worse not better. An example of this inept leadership is a failure to address the third ward councilman after his arrest for solicitation of prostitution. You said he has just been a stellar citizen in all ways. Stellar citizen in all ways, really? Human trafficking, really? Your weak call for resignation had Andy

Young, editor emeritus of The Chronicle Telegram say of council that you serve their interest I divorcing themselves from him and protecting your power. It was evident your performance is pitiful and has failed the residents of this city. You're inaction to immediately remove your colleague off committees and demand resignation shows you fo not have the stomach for the tough decisions and you now will be called into account. Tomorrow, Elyrians will do just that."

Lowell Cavin, 211 E. River St., General appearance of city related to garbage cans, littering, parking on sidewalks and front yards. Mr. Cavin stated he wanted to make general observations about the appearance of the city. Mr. Cavin stated that one of his main concerns that he has contacted the Safety Service Director and his ward councilman about garbage cans that are left in the streets, specifically in his neighborhood. Mr. Cavin expressed garbage cans overfilled and littering around many business parking areas. President Stewart responded that the attempt to address the garbage cans have been made by placing letters with the sanitation department on the cans as well as knocking on the doors of those owners. President Stewart shared that council will continue to work with the Safety Service Director to encourage residents to remove the cans from the curb lawn, because it is an eyesore. President Stewart promised to meet with Mr. Cavin after the meeting to establish a follow up plan with himself, Mr. Cavin and Safety Service Director Brubaker. Mr. Oswald stated that he and Mr. Cavin have been experiencing this situation for a long time and that they have been constantly doing exactly what they have been told to do. He expressed that the issue is habitual and a solution is needed. Mayor Whitfield thanked Mr. Cavin for sharing his concern. He expressed that internally the City of Elyria will look at staffing structure and job culture ownership where employees across all departments will develop a public service mindset. Mayor Whitfield echoed Mr. Oswald's point of resident accountability, stated in addition that resident would foster enough pride in the city that they wold not be responsible for these acts. Mr. Cavin asked about holding property owners responsible. Law Directory Deery responded yes, an ordinance does exist, residents may be cited by law enforcement and if cited, they would go to court. Law Director Deery expressed some people are unable to remove their garbage cans fro the curb lawn, all residents can be cited, however, there is no way to decipher from residents that are capable or not, or case by case basis. The other consideration pointed out by the Law Director is the utilization of resources. She posed the question of is that how we would like to utilize our police force, to cite residents for garbage cans? Enforcement can be take against property owners and tenants. Mr. Brubaker stated the Law Director covered the bulk of what he was going to say, what he added was, when a property maintenance complaint (whether it's trash or house) the city has to cite the owner. The notice of violation goes to the owner always, even if it is a rental property, a notice is sent to the property as well as to the owner. The trash can violation carries a \$50 fine per day that is issued by the Elyria Police Department. SSD Brubaker reiterated Law Director Deery's statement in that an internal discussion would need to be had regarding the use of resources. Mrs. Mitchell shared that Mr. Cavin shared a concern about residents also parking across sidewalks. There have been numerous complaints regarding this issue from a repeat resident. Councilwoman Mitchell and SSD Brubaker in discussion have talked about calling the police, however again they believe that is not the best use of Elyria Police force time. However, at the same time, Mrs. Mitchell is

concerned with the responsibility that she has to her residents. She has to tell them to call the police. Mrs. Mitchell confirms there is an ordinance on the books, you can not park your car in the grass or across the sidewalks, but if it is not being enforced, it does no good. Mr. Brubaker co-signed Mrs. Mitchell's statement. He further explained that when the calls come through, they are handled through the building department. The building department cites the owner, the owner has 30 days to comply. When the owner complies, the process starts all over again.

### 8. PETITIONS COUNCIL:

Councilman Tollett stated that during this election season one of the very loose words being thrown around was the word character. He stated that wanted to introduce a new word, hypocrisy. He stated that the republican candidates skipped a public debate to attend a fundraiser for Jim Jordan instead of discussing issues publicly, so that the public could understand what everyone stood for, that would be hypocrisy. Mr. Tollett shared that Jim Jordan participated in the largest cover-up in American history of molestation of 1500 students at Ohio State University. He questioned where was the anger. He expressed that "you" fly the flag of a twice impeached president who cheated on all three of his wives including prostitutes.... and attack all of city council for the actions of one. He directed his next statement to his independent candidates, in stating that one of the candidates beat a woman unconscious, breaking out teeth, holds a felony conviction and numerous other domestic violence convictions. He asked again about the outrage. He shared his thoughts of his fellow council members, Mrs. Mitchell, Mrs. Simmons, Mrs. Davis, Mrs. Keys, getting beat unconscious. He asked the voters to think about this tomorrow when it's your turn. Voters see through hypocrisy and are much more in tuned to these issues than you think.

Councilwoman Davis shared that she has resided in the City of Elyria for fifty years, she is the second ward councilwoman. She expressed that she finds it difficult to understand these people who want to drastically change the city body, making decisions when the city is governed by a city ordinance. These individuals make sure to stop in and criticize, but they forget to consider the leadership from whom they work. She questioned if there has been any offer to train all employees for human trafficking. She stated this is training that could have been implemented through the Mayor's office. She stated the vocal opposition would rather clap, high five, give big hugs during a pandemic than work on training city employees. They would rather change the city sitting council by showing up two or three times a year complaining and instead of trying to learn the true function of council. The opposition group would like for council to have scheduled times for our constituents to have the ability to speak to council members, she stated that her colleagues and herself have informed their constituents that they are available 24-7, just a phone call away. Council is committed to the city and all of it's residents, with truth and they fight and work together for the betterment of this great city where the lights will never go out.

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

Giada is a 9th grader from Avon. She dedicated and filled both boxes last Tuesday. She is now asking for the community's help to assist in


keeping these boxes filled year-round. The dedication was held at the City Hall location.

### Survey Data

The Think Tank conducted a survey to gather input on the needs and desires of the South Elyria community about the construction of a pocket park. Below are the major findings of the survey from 44 respondents.

- 44 total respondents where 54% either live, work, or visit South Elyria.
- The ages of respondents ranged from 19 yrs to 61+ years old. The majority of respondents were 61+ years old.
- We found that the majority of people want a play area for children, an area to walk, benches, a shaded pavilion, and open green space.
- Some potential programming the community wants to see is walking/exercising, active play areas for children, and a fresh farmers market in conjunction with the community garden.

### Walkability and Park Access maps - LCPH data

During the Think Tank, students met with representatives from Lorain County Public Health where they discussed walkability and park access in South Elyria. While South Elyria is walkable, park access (within a 10 minute walk) is limited.

South Rec is nearby, but without proper crosswalks it is unsafe for people to walk to the park which may be the only option due to lack of transportation.

### Walk Audit findings

Students conducted a walk audit of the empty lot on the corner of 15th Street and West Avenue and recorded the following.

### Sidewalks:

- Cracks in the sidewalk cause potential tripping hazards.
- Unlevel and narrow sidewalks causing people to walk on the streets.

### Street Safety:

- No pedestrian signals at crosswalks.
- Distracted drivers
- Lack of street lights

### Comfort:

- Not enough natural shade or tree canopies
- No benches/places to rest
- Litter on sidewalks and in road

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



In October 2020, the City of Elyria Wastewater Department became a member of the Ohio Department of Health Wastewater Epidemiology Network (WEN). Twice weekly, we send plant influent samples to MICROBAC, a molecular biology laboratory. At MICROBAC, they analyze the samples for the amount of COVID-19 viral RNA in each sample. The results are used to see, as a trend, whether the viral RNA gene counts are increasing, staying the same, or decreasing. These numbers are compared with the number of known COVID-19 cases in Elyria. If the gene counts are going up but the number of known cases are staying the same, it could be an indication that there are a number of asymptomatic COVID cases in Elyria. The data on the dashboard only reflects what is happening in Elyria, and our data has correlated very well throughout the pandemic.

The top graph in the screenshot shows the Million COVID-19 gene copies counted per day, based on plant flow for each sampling day (Sundays and Wednesdays). As you can see, back in December 2020, we were getting above a million counts, and we are currently down to 10,000 counts. This is a good trend in that it continues to drop. It shows that COVID-19 is still prevalent in the community, but is has greatly improved.

The bottom graph in the screenshot shows two things: The black line shows the rolling 7-day average number of actual know cases of COVID-19 in Elyria that have actually tested positive for COVID-19. The red lines show the average gene copies per liter of plant influent sample sent out for analysis. These numbers are what we watch to predict future increases in cases, and also to follow current cases. Persons who are infected with COVID-19 will continue to shed virus particles in the feces for a variable amount of time. You will note that, in November 2020 through April 2020, the number of gene copies per liter were rather high, and so were the number of actual COVID-19 cases in Elyria (as high as 44 cases per day). The August 1, 2021 spike was a forewarning that an increase in cases might be coming, as it did September into October 2021 with a high of 35 cases per day. In September 2021, ODH changed testing labs and the numbers of gene copies reported dropped due to the different test method, but the trend is still there. The new lab also has the ability to test for the different variants of the virus. Currently, the most prominent variant in our area is still the Delta variant. They are working on reformulating the graph to rescale the data to make it easier to see. Once that is done, the red spikes in September through October will be much higher. In the meantime, we are going by the raw data. The spike on September 12<sup>th</sup> was a forewarning of the second peak on October 5<sup>th</sup> where the cases of COVID-19 went back up to 33 per day. The number of cases per day typically lags behind the gene counts by anywhere from 7-14 days. As you can see, our current number of cases is back down to 14 per day. We are looking to see what happens there after Halloween, Thanksgiving Day, and the Christmas holidays – times when we see typically would see additional increases in the data.

We have continuous access to the ODH COVID-19 dashboard. Results are posted to the dashboard within two days after sending out the samples. So, we can see the data rather quickly. In addition, if we get three consecutive increasing data points, or if any one data point increases above a certain percentage, ODH will send us an alert email advising us of the situation. We forward the information to Mayor Whitfield, Safety Service Director Brubaker and Director Williams. They can then correspond with the Director of Lorain County Public Health to schedule additional testing clinics, additional public service announcements, or whatever is deemed necessary.

The costs of the entire program are paid by grants from the State of Ohio so the City pays nothing to participate in this program. Participating in the program has been very interesting and informative. Our hope is that the data continues to show declines in all parameters and that we will be out of this pandemic phase and into the endemic phase soon. The program is funded through June 2023, and we will continue to participate and track the data all the way through.
