In addition, the police added the their workforce, Matt Cavanaugh was hired as a police officer, he joins the force as an eleven year veteran from the Cleveland Police department. EPD received grant approval of forty thousand dollars for bullet proof vests from the State of Ohio. Request for referral was made from the floor for the Ohio Violent Crime Consortium grant.

Mr. Cerra asked if any information is shared with the citizens regarding the tip411 about what action took place. Chief Pelko, responded sharing of information would be case by case and depend on the sensitivity on the case.

#### Eng. McKillips:

Engineer McKillips provided information on road restoration projects following the lead line service replacement projects. Saw cutting will take place on East Broad St. Road restoration will take place on 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, 15<sup>th</sup> Streets and Mussey Ave. Road detours anticipated in the areas of road restoration work. Columbia Gas is scheduled to begin a project on the 9<sup>th</sup> Street and Middle Ave. There were issues reported of water in the gas main. Additional planned work for Columbia Gas will be in the Boston and Fairlawn areas.

President Stewart had a question regarding the cutovers on East Broad St. Engineer McKillips explained part of the work that is scheduled is designed to take care of the trench repair issue. Hopes are East Broad Street project will go up for bid this summer, plans are at 85% completed. The project is currently in the final stage with anticipation of starting in the fall. Challenges are presented with material delays of concrete pipe and ductile iron pipe. Mr Lipian asked if there is a possibility of having asphalt on Harvard and Concord. Engineer McKillips ensured that she would pass along the request. Mrs. Mitchell inquired bout when the project on Penfield would be completed. Ms. McKillips explained that the underground work is near completion. The last catch basins are in the process of being installed and restoration will begin. Mrs. Mitchell inquired about the bid for 2022 street paving. Ms. McKillips explained the Engineer department is working on the street paving bid. Mr. Cerra inquired about the big dig on Poplar St. Ms. McKillips explained that the permit to install has been submitted to the E.P.A (Environmental Protection Agency) in Columbus for review. She anticipates bid advertising in May and bid in June. Mr. Oswald asked a question about a project on Poplar. Engineer McKillips explained that a 108 inch storm sewer goes under East Bridge Street, we have a big sewer that needs to be

placed directly through it. A chamber has to be built to accommodate the flow around one or the other, since both sewers operate by gravity. Mrs. Simmons inquired n when the Fuller Rd. Project would begin. Ms. McKillips explained the Fuller Rd. Project can not be awarded until after July 1, 2022 due to involvement of Ohio Public Works funding, as well as a joint project with the county.

Chair Stewart responded that prior discussion had been held, in addition the item is on the agenda for upcoming committee meeting.

# City passes budget, punts on old school

ELYRIA - Elyria City Council gave final approval to the 2022 permanent appropriations budget Monday, but punted on one of Mayor Frank Whitfield's key proposals.

The \$32.9 million general fund budget will not include \$1 million for the renovation of the former Oakwood Elementary School, which the administration hopes to transform into an intergenerational community center in collaboration with Elyria nonprofit Save Our Children.

Councilman Kenny Oswald, D-4th Ward, brought forward an amendment on the floor to eliminate the funding for the time being, stressing more questions need to be answered.

"I'd like just to get the information. ... If we need \$1.5 (million) and that's going to do it, I'm happy to give you \$1.5 (million) as soon as we get all of our ducks in a row. I want to know what we're getting, what we're doing and as soon as we can do that, we can make a good decision," Oswald said.

In a joint meeting of Elyria City Council's Community Development and Finance committees last week, the Oakwood proposal sparked much debate with Council questioning the short- and long-term financial plan, management of the building and concerns that the city's arrangement with Save Our Children and other potential community partners had not been finalized.

The building acquired by the city in a property swap with Elyria Schools needs immediate repairs to the roof to address leaking with additional upgrades needed for the windows, doors, HVAC system and to bring the bathrooms into ADA compliance.

The administration initially asked for \$1.5 million in American Rescue Plan funds with the committee reaching a compromise, recommending \$1 million. Initial estimates obtained by the city indicate the roof replacement will cost \$500,000 and window replacements coming in at \$200,000. At the time, Assistant Safety Service Director Tim Williams said estimates for the rest of the repairs were in the process of being obtained.

Reacting to Council's decision, Williams said "it's kind of shocking." He said he wished the administration had gotten some notification but noted it will continue to work with Council to provide the details they need in order to move forward on the project.

Whitfield was not in attendance for Monday's meeting. Reached for comment afterward, he said while still gathering information on what happened, he found it interesting the committee members were willing to move forward last week without Council President Vic Stewart's support, only to change their minds a week later.
