

- Each student may submit only one entry and each entry must be the original work of only one student.
- Each entry <u>must</u> be accompanied by an official contest entry form. (Stapled to the essay if hard copy is submitted).

- Please ensure document access settings permit public reading and downloading.
- ◆ There is no maximum or minimum length, however successful essays tend to be 1-2 typed pages.
- Entries that are deemed by the OCRC to infringe upon copyright protected material will be disqualified.
- Entries received after the deadline may not be considered in the competition.
- ♦ Hard copies of entries will not be returned.
